

**STATEMENT BY THE DELEGATION OF THE REPUBLIC OF INDONESIA
ON AGENDA 7 A, D, F, J: ROADMAP GAP NCDS, IMPLEMENTATION OF NCDS POLICIES,
MENTAL HEALTH, WP GCM NCDS
THE 150TH SESSION OF THE WHO EXECUTIVE BOARD**

Indonesia thanks the Secretariat for the report for this item on the agenda.

The COVID-19 has created a humanitarian crisis that necessitates policy and strategic changes in order to fulfil the 2030 NCDs worldwide targets.

At national level, Indonesia is dedicated to continuing its efforts and focus on NCDs, such as diabetes and cervical cancer.

Regulations and policies for NCD prevention and control have been established, involving cross-sector coordination and backed by adequate resource allocation.

NCD prevention, care, and control are given considerable consideration in the design and implementation of the national UHC benefit package.

Increased NCD literacy in the community as a result of active community participation.

In terms of the work plan for the Global Coordination Mechanism, Indonesia believes that it is critical to create an accessible platform for GCM/NCD, which includes people living with NCDs.

Such platform will improve coordination and collaboration in the fight against NCDs, and to facilitate best practice sharing among member states.

Indonesia approves the annexes 5 and 6 progress reports and requests that WHO expedite the implementation of the reports' follow-up activities.

Indonesia is of the view that close coordination among member states, international institutions, and the global community in general will enable us to meet the global NCDs objective of 2030.
