


Universal Health and Preparedness Review - Genesis

- Nov 2020: DG announces UHPR
- WHA75, 2022: UHPR concept note noted by Member States (<u>A75/21</u>)
- National review process piloted in 5 countries between December 2020 and May 2023 (CAR, Iraq, Portugal, Thailand, Sierra Leone)
- Upcoming country pilots in Cameroon, Dominican Republic, Luxembourg, the Republic of Congo, and Tanzania
- UHPR discussed during ongoing intergovernmental negotiations (INB and WGIHR)
- EB decision <u>EB154(9)</u> January 2024, requests the organization to continue the voluntary pilot phase and provide a report to WHA78



EB decision, document EB154(9)



- (1) continue developing the voluntary pilot phase of the Universal Health and Preparedness Review
 - in consultation with Member States
 - according to report A75/21 and feedback from Member States
 - without prejudice to the INB and the WGIHR processes
 - building on existing mechanisms
 - complementary to and non-duplicative of existing modalities and evaluation tools and processes used by Member States
- (2) to report on lessons learned, implications, benefits, challenges, and options for the next steps through EB156 to the WHA78 in 2025



Universal Health and Preparedness Review

The COVID-19 pandemic highlighted major gaps in the global health architecture:

- No country was prepared for a health emergency of the scale and severity of Covid19
- Fragmentation in response strategies
- Lack of platforms for sharing of experiences
 and peer-to-peer learning between MS
- Insufficient international cooperation and solidarity



Benefits of the UHPR

Global level

- Encourage peer-learning, innovation, and pooling of best practices between Member States
- Keep health emergency preparedness high on the political agenda to break the cycle of 'panic and neglect'
- Promote solidarity and cooperation between Member States

National level

- Elevate health emergency preparedness to the highest level of government
- Enhance multisectoral, whole-of-society approaches
- Safeguard hard-won gains of the Covid-19 response (networks, knowledge, experience)
- Promote predictable and sustainable investment in preparedness by rallying domestic and global resources and solutions towards support to identified priorities

Agreement, 30 October 2023

Article 8. Preparedness monitoring and functional reviews

(4) The Parties shall establish, no later than 31 December 2026, a global peer review mechanism to assess pandemic prevention, preparedness and response capacities and gaps, as well as levels of readiness, with the aim of promoting and supporting learning among Parties, best practices, actions and accountability, at the national, regional and global levels, to strengthen national health emergency preparedness and readiness capacities.



First Global Peer Review, 13 & 14 February 2024

Background

- The UHPR Concept Note (<u>A75/21</u>) foresees two phases:
 - 1. A national review
 - 2. A global peer review
- So far, 5 countries piloted the national review phase and expressed their wish to complete the first piloting cycle
- Consultation with all MS on the draft working methods of the global peer review, 3 July 2024

Rationale for piloting the global peer review phase:

- The global peer review phase is a central element of the value proposition of the UHPR process
- Opportunity to gather concrete experiences that will inform the continuous development of the UHPR
- Further inform ongoing discussions of the INB and IHR Working Group



Global Peer Review Phase - Key Principles

- Intergovernmental and cooperative process, based on the equality of treatment of all Member States
- Respects Member States' sovereignty and focuses on technical issues
- Based on voluntary participation
- Ensures the involvement of the Member State undertaking the review throughout the entire process
- Includes all Member States in the design and conduct of the review
- Avoids politicization and "naming-and-shaming" through a collaborative and technical approach
- Considers differences in Member States' capacities
- Adopts a whole-of-society and whole-of-government approach



Global Peer Review Phase – working methods

- In line with the UHPR concept note (A75/21, May 2022) and consultation with MS on July 3, 2023
- Member States are reviewed individually
- A peer review panel composed of representatives of 3 Member States
- Facilitated by WHO
- A written phase, open to all MS and stakeholders
- Review open to all MS with a Q&A session



Next steps

- Outcome report of the global peer review to be made available on the WHO website
- WHO to provide a report on "lessons learned, implications, benefits, challenges, and options for the next steps" to WHA78, in line with <u>EB</u> decision EB154(9)
- Streamlining of the national review phase, in line with Member States feedback and lessons learnt from national pilots
- Continued consultation with member states on the technical development of the UHPR
